## **Bible Study Questions**

- 1. Read Psalm 19
  - What attitudes do you see in this chapter towards the law?
  - What is the law so precious to David?
- 2. Thomas talked about God being our coach. Why is it so foolish for us to ignore him?
  - What steps can you take to better engage with God's Word?
- 3. Read Psalm 136
  - What do you notice about this Psalm? What kind of emotions does it create in you toward God?
- 4. The word "love" is the Hebrew word "hessed" which refers to God's faithfulness in lavishing undeserved kindness. Psalm 136 asserts that "hessed" is God's gut instinct.
  - How does knowing this impact the way that you view God?
  - We are to share in God's heart. What does it look like for us to reflect God's character of "hessed"?
- 5. Psalm 136 lists a number of things that God does because of his "hessed". What are some things that you would praise God for that he does because of his "hessed"?

## July 16th Torah and the Great Hallel

#### **Psalm 19: Thomas Toedter Preaches**

Thomas' main idea was that we have an incredible gift given to us in God's Word. To ignore God's Word is similar to doing a sport with a top coach, only to ignore their council. The wise man studies and applies God's Word.

**Psalm 136:** Jewish scholars refer to Psalms 136 as being the "Great Hallel" or the "great praise". It provides a template for us to praise our God. The Psalm contains an unique format with a line followed by "his love endures forever" repeated 26 times.

### I. Psalm 136

- a. Hessed is God's continual kindness lavished on underserving people: Once again we run into a Hebrew word "hessed" which refers to God's faithfulness in continually lavishing acts of kindness of undeserving people. Different Bibles translate it as "love, kindness, steadfast love."
- b. God acts because hessed is intrinsic to his nature: The Hebrew adds the word "because" before each repeating line. The message is that God does great deeds precisely because his gut instinct is to show hessed to his people.
- II. We can live with confidence in God's compassion toward his children.: There are many people who think of the Old Testament God as being judgmental and angry. But this Old Testament psalm is a declaration of who God's people had discovered him to be. We can live with that same confidence that God is a God of hessed to us.
