- 1. Have you ever had an experience in which you felt as if God was indifferent to your problems? How did you work through that?
- 2. Read 1 John 4:9-10, Luke 12:6-7, and Romans 8:28-30: What do these verses teach us about how God views us.
- 3. One of the problems is that God's vision for our future is often different then our own vision. If you were to fully design what your life would be like ten years from now, how would you design it?

## March 17<sup>th</sup> He Wants What Is Best For Me Knows What That Is

Steve Jobs (founder of Apple), grew up in the church. He ended up embracing atheism because no one would answer his question about why God would allow suffering to exist in the world. In the face of suffering, we often wonder about who God is. Is he indifferent or uncaring to our needs? Is he unable to come to our rescue? The truth is that God does want our best and knows what is best for us. While there are many reasons for pain, pain is one of God's tools to help bring about our best.

### I. Reality of God

- God wants what is best for you: This theme runs throughout Scripture. The Old Testament reveals the God who lavishly pours out kindness on undeserving people. The ultimate example through God's gift of Jesus so that we may find life (1 John 4:9-10). Like a good father, God desires that his children flourish.
- God knows what is best for you: God not only wants our best but knows what is best. He knows all things and knows us even better than we know ourselves. (Luke 12:6-7)
- II. The problem: Our vision often differs from God's: While we either know or hope that God knows what is best, we are often surprised when we discover God's plan. Our vision of

- "best" often involves success and prosperity. God often takes his people down a different path
- God cares more about growth than our comfort: God desires to transform us, killing life in the flesh and replacing it with life through his spirit. (Romans 6:6-7, James 1:2-4))
- God cares more about our purpose then our success:
  God cares less in us achieving our life goals then for us
  to be partners with him in his grand mission of
  redemption.
- Growth and purpose rarely come without cost: Pain is the tool that God most often uses in developing us. He told his disciples to pick up their crosses, the ultimate form of torture and death, and to follow him (Matthew 10:38).

#### III. Action steps

- Seek God's best for your life: If we really trust God, then we should be looking for his "best". For some it is a season of prosperity and for others it may be a difficult season of growth. God's best may take us into uncomfortable ministry situations where we get to work alongside of God in his work.
- Embrace God's lead: The final step is to follow wherever God leads.
